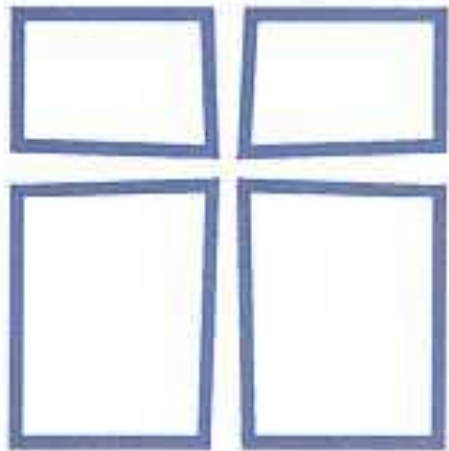

Worldwide Celebrations

200th birth anniversary of Mother M. Theresia Scherer

The contributions from all over the world together form a large bouquet of joy and gratitude. We present it to Mother M. Theresia and say: "It continues to blossom after you." We are grateful to you. For the sake of convenience, the contributions are arranged in the usual order of provinces and vicariates.

Festivals and celebrations in the Province Switzerland

The convent hill has always been a meeting place for everyone who lives, works, goes to school, attends church services, spends time in quiet contemplation before God or stops at the Hüggle Cafe, but this year the diversity and intensity has increased. It has been an eventful and touching year.

The **pilgrimage** and **real celebrations** were marked by festive music from various choirs and ensembles, words of thanks and appreciation for Mother M. Theresia

from various preachers, and pilgrims of hope from near and far. The celebrations on 31 October, her actual birthday, with Bishop Joseph Maria Bonnemain and many sisters from European provinces, on 29 October, the day of her beatification, and on 31 August, the feast of the Congregation in all languages with a livestream around the world, are truly unforgettable. The services were always open to the public, but were given their own special highlights by the presence of various groups, such as sisters from our worldwide community, sisters and brothers from many orders in

Switzerland, faithful from the parishes of Ingenbohl and Meggen, employees of the convent, former sisters and members of the convent circle. September 14, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, was particularly touching, with over 60 Menzingen sisters present!

We also want not to forget the many who, day after day, alone or in small groups, spent time in silence in the crypt!

Two projects

While the celebrations attracted many people, two projects also met with great interest. Both were realised in collaboration with the municipality of Ingenbohl:

The **convent route** on the hill, which recalls important events in the history of our institute at nine stations along a circular route, is also intended as an extension of the

existing cultural route in the municipality of Ingenbohl.

An **art exhibition** featuring works by 12 renowned artists impressively demonstrated how people are creatively dealing with our times of upheaval and uncertainty and inspiring reflection. The exhibition and the works were united by the powerful theme: '**Defying fragility**'.

A day in Meggen

On 30 October, responsible members of the Meggen parish prepared a memorable day for over 60 sisters from various European provinces. We were guided through the day with great warmth and attention.

The day began with Holy Mass in St. Mary Magdalene's Church, where Mother M. Theresia was baptised. Veneranda Qerimi, head of the pastoral team, welcomed us with the following words:

"Dear sisters, welcome to Meggen, the place where the roots of your history lie. It was here that God called a person to make the world a little different, more humane, more just and more open to the poor and disadvantaged. The birth anniversary we are celebrating today is a reason to be deeply

grateful: grateful for the gift of Maria Theresia Scherer's life. God needs people to change the world, just as he needed Maria Theresia at that time. God also needs us today so that he can be felt, seen and present in our world. We thank God for this and pray for his blessing and his guidance for your community, for your work and your endeavours.

The presence of the pastor and his staff, many worshippers, the organist, and the multilingual songbook showed us how much Meggen had prepared for us. Father Thomas Zimmermann began his sermon with a poem by Otto Heigold, which describes a prophet in extraordinary images. Finding these words fitting for Mother M. Theresia, he had them recited by religion teacher Clivia Vogel as follows:

'The wind blows in her direction.

*On her face
is a star.
She travels through time,
illuminates the nights,
calls out to people,
shows them the way,
takes them with her.'*

A short bus drive took us to the place where Mother M. Theresia's parents' house was once situated. As it had to make way for a new development, the Maria Theresia fountain now stands on this spot. The caretaker had cleaned it up for the day and lovingly decorated it with flowers.

Another surprise awaited us down by the lake: we were allowed to enter the house where Katharina had lived with her two unmarried uncles after her father's death, where she had spent so many happy hours with music and dancing. Until now, this house could only be viewed from the outside!

In the meantime, busy hands had set and decorated the tables in the parish hall. It was touching to be served by children aged around eleven – and so skilfully too. Three slightly older girls presented episodes from the life of Mother M. Theresia. As they took off their caps in one scene and said, 'We salute you, Mother M. Theresia,' so also we salute all those who gave us such an unforgettable day in Meggen.

The event concluded with a multilingual vespers service in the parish church of St. Pius. Mother M. Theresia would certainly have been proud of her Meggen community.

b) Province Croatia

The 200th birth anniversary of Blessed Mother M. Theresia Scherer was inaugurated on 16 November 2024 at the Provincial House in Đakovo under the theme: 'Blessed Mother M. Theresia – Pilgrim of Hope'.

In Đakovo, a pilgrim day is held on the 16th of every month. On this day, the jubilee candle decorated with three crosses is lit, and pilgrims are given relic cards.

The main celebration of the jubilee

for our province took place on the feast of Blessed Mother M. Theresia, 16 June 2025. The solemn Mass in the convent church of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in Đakovo was presided over by Arch Bishop Mons. Dr. Đuro Hranić.

The open house at the Mother Theresia Home from 27 to 31 October 2025 gave individuals and groups of young people and children the opportunity to visit the first provincial house of the Sisters of Mercy of the Holy Cross in Đakovo. Mother M. Theresia stayed there during her four visits to the sisters of the Croatian province. Visitors had the opportunity to watch a video and view an exhibition about the life and work of Blessed Mother M. Theresia and to pray in the house chapel.

c) Province Czech Republic

d) Province Slovakia

e) Province India Central

f) Province India North East

With hearts full of joy and gratitude, the 200th Birth Anniversary of our Foundress, Bl. Mother Maria Theresia Scherer, was celebrated in all our communities together with the parishioners. This bicentenary is a moment of grace, reflecting on the

vision and heritage of a woman whose spirit continues to inspire.

October 31, 2024, marked the opening ceremony of the jubilee, continued by Charism retreats for all the sisters during the year. Each community planted a sapling in her memorial, symbolizing growth rooted in faith.

From January 1, 2025, a special novena was prayed daily for the intentions of the Congregation. Monthly recollections, guided by the General Administration, deepened our spiritual journey. The inspiring biography "A Case of Commitment" was read in all communities, culminating in a Province-level quiz competition.

The celebrations remind us that a jubilee is not merely a commemoration of the past but a renewed mandate to respond to the challenges of our time. Indeed, the Bicentennial Jubilee of our beloved Mother reignited our spirit to live the original spirit and charism more effectively by responding to the needs of the time in our present context.

h) Province Europa Mitte

On St. Francis Day, 4 October 2025, the Holy Cross Sisters celebrated the 200th birthday of their founder, Mother Maria Theresia Scherer.

Cathedral Vicar and Religious Advisor Adi Trawöger celebrated Mass at the hospital in Wels with 120 sisters from all regions of the province (Styria, Tyrol, Bavaria, Hungary, Slovenia, Lower Austria and Upper Austria), the management and staff of the hospital and the 'Bruderliebe' nursing home.

In her sermon, Sr. Maria Esther Ganhör focused on key aspects of Mother M. Theresia's life: her longing for God and the tenderness with which she treated the people of her time. "Our founder focused on

sharing and togetherness. In the lives of people like her and St. Francis, whose feast day we also celebrate today, we find the tenderness with which God encounters us. It is about being a source of relief for oneself and for those who are weary, and sharing with tenderness."

The service and ceremony were accompanied by music from Sr. Margret Scheurecker on the organ and Katrin and Maria Felbermayr on the flute and guitar.

Sr. Petra Car, Provincial Superior, appreciated the work of the many sisters and leaders who continue the work today in the spirit of the charism of the Holy Cross Sisters. The first sisters, who had been serving others in Switzerland with



Father Theodosius since 1856, came to Wels in 1860. The province of Upper Austria was founded in 1865, 160 years ago. A double anniversary in Upper Austria!

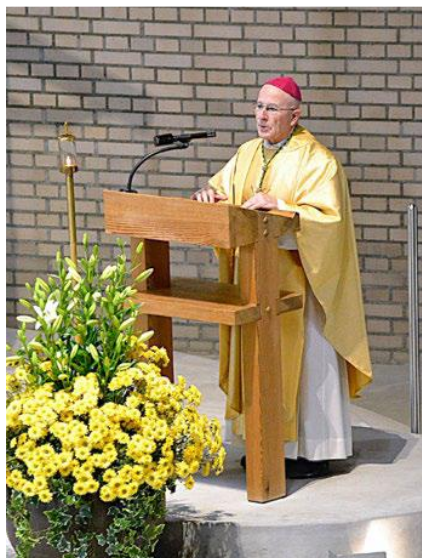

Homily by Bishop Joseph Maria Bonnemain in the Ingenbohl Convent Church

Josef Bonnemain, the diocesan Bishop of Chur, knows Mother M. Theresia well. And he knows her sisters even better! In the course of his work, he has met the Ingenbohl sisters time and again. So it was a joy and an honour for him and for us that he presided over the festive service on the 200th birthday of Mother M. Theresia. He left his sermon for the Theodosia.

Dear sisters and daughters of Blessed Mother M. Theresia Scherer, fellow brothers, pilgrims, guests, sisters and brothers

When I received the invitation to celebrate this very special and memorable birthday Mass, I did not hesitate for a moment. It is a deep joy for me to be here and to celebrate the Eucharist at the tomb of the Blessed with the entire community of Ingenbohl and many admirers of Mother M. Theresia. The Sisters of Ingenbohl have accompanied and supported me throughout a long period of my life. When I began my service in the Bishop's Ordinariate in Chur in 1981, a considerable number of sisters were still working there, and this continued for several years. When, four years later – in 1985 – I also took up my work as a chaplain at the Limmattal Hospital in Schlieren, I found the Ingenbohl sisters there too. They managed and looked after the Theodosianum, the nursing school, and worked as nurses in all wards of the hospital. In



both places, I was able to experience their quiet, sensitive, witty and refined support – I could tell many anecdotes – which I have not forgotten even today.

The inspiration and charisma that Mother M. Theresia received 200 years ago have shaped the lives and character of the sisters to this day. This influence is lived out in the present and adapts to the needs and ways of thinking of each era. Seen in

this light, this influence remains relevant and enriches the entire Church. It is about love and care for the suffering, the poor and the disadvantaged in society. This is how the foundation, the history of the Sisters of Mercy of the Holy Cross in Chur, began and gradually spread to many countries. The deepest motivation for this service is not limited to social commitment, but springs from love for God and therefore love for people, especially those who receive the least love. It is therefore very fitting that the reading from 1 Corinthians (chapter 13) for today's solemnity is the hymn to love. Our love for God is only genuine if it finds expression in love for our neighbour. The adventure of Christian life consists in always seeking God, finding him, encountering him and loving him. There is no other way to achieve this than to seek out people, to find them exactly where they are, to encounter them holistically – Mother Theresia was truly a champion in this – and to love them through acts of service. We are all familiar with the words of the Blessed: 'It is a matter of discovering the grain of gold that is hidden in every person.' Even today, she invites us to go on a journey of discovery. Little by little, we will realise that not only a grain of gold is hidden in every person, but a

precious treasure that needs to be brought to light. This birth requires perseverance, patience, sensitivity and versatility. The educational institutions that the Ingenbohl Sisters gradually established exhibit these characteristics. It is not only about professional and technical skills, but also about promoting the whole person :

'Far-sighted'! it is also about promoting the arts, culture, creativity and spirituality. How much these educational institutions of the Ingenbohl Sisters have contributed to the advancement of women and their position and role in society over the last 200 years!

Just a few days ago, the Pope addressed students from all the Pontifical Universities in Rome and spoke of this 'far-sightedness of education'. He reflected on the healing of the bent woman in the Gospel of Luke and said, among other things: 'The state of ignorance, which is often associated with closed-mindedness and a lack of spiritual and intellectual restlessness, resembles the condition of this woman: she is completely bent over, withdrawn into herself, and therefore unable to see beyond herself. When a person is unable to look beyond oneself, one's

own experiences, ideas and convictions, one's own plans, one remains trapped, one remains a slave, unable to form one's own judgement. As with the bent woman in the Gospel, there is always the danger that we will remain prisoners of a gaze directed toward ourselves' (Homily of Pope Leo on Monday, 27 October 2025).

Dear sisters and brothers, I am convinced that our Blessed would like to encourage us all today to attain this 'far-sightedness' of which the Pope spoke, which is only possible through holistic education, upbringing and care. She was very bold and dared to be ahead of her time. Today, she would certainly encourage us to make positive use of new educational opportunities, achievements and advances in

healthcare, new educational perspectives opened up by digital and virtual media, and even artificial intelligence for the promotion of humanity and faith.

Beloved in the Lord, such examples of blessedness and holiness inspire us to have a preference for the poor, the hungry, the thirsty, the persecuted, the imprisoned, the discriminated and the sick, so that they may walk upright through life and history in recognition of their sacred dignity. Let us be instruments of this saving hope! May Blessed Mother M. Theresia be an intercessor for us all in these concerns.

‘Discover the grain of Gold’

In Devala one of our communities of South province, I have come across with gold panning. It is a very dreary and hope filled work. The labourers dig deep the earth to take out stones, hard mud for the purpose. These stones and mud are powdered and panned to trace out the gold grains. What a joy for the labourer to discover that there are sediments of gold in his pan. Blessed Mother Maria Theresia had



said, “Discover the grain of gold in every person”. It indicates her keen interest and trust in the people for the possibility of good outcome. She could envisage the inherent potential for growth of those whom she encountered. This optimism in her elated an Italian gardener from his dipsomania. Happily returning home sober and responsible to support the family in their dire need for financial assistance and care. She nurtured a deep trust in the transforming power and love of God.

Often I wondered, how on earth a Mother General with a fast developing congregation, can invest quantity and quality time with definite purpose and grace for others. Can we forget she taking tuition for the visual impaired child, serving the neighbourhood children on feast days, taking a night duty for a timid one, to care for the wounded soldiers a rare ministry of those days, to deal with high-ranking officials and empresses, to be loyal and noble in clearing the debts, to write on the other side of the request letters “Granted”. Wow! She not only

discovered grains of gold but even discovered the hole in a shoe of her sister. What a way to touch people.

No wonder “all could have their eyes on her” and we read about her; whenever some situation demanded a person of more than usual skill in human relationship and courage, the genial Capuchin’s thoughts usually settled on Sr. Maria Theresia. That’s why people could record “one of the reasons for the success of the Holy Cross Sisters was the fact that, she had the “golden hand” in choosing the right sisters for the right tasks. Winning style of management. Her special trait.

When vocations were abundant, she took personal interest to convince the father of a future candidate, even by milking his cow. What a marvellous way to discover and invite the girls to help them respond to God.

Dr. Carl Hilty, dived into the depth of her personal treasures and discovered not only the grains of gold; but the gold mine, she herself. He acknowledges her resourcefulness; “Of all the women we have ever seen, Mother Theresia was the most capable of assuming leadership. She was able to take all the difficulties of life and her vocation calmly. Finally, her total

detachment from all personal egoism was the secret of her influence upon others”. What a way to summarize the personality of our Bl. Mother M. Theresia Scherer. She let us continue to discover the gold mine that she is. I am sure, it is her invitation to us today to further this discovery in every human being, in the eco system, in the cosmos, especially as we honour her inception here on earth in this the bicentenary.

In the stillness of my heart with Mother M. Theresia

Sometimes, when I stand at the bedside of a young patient and take the child's hand in mine, I think quietly of Mother M. Theresia Scherer. And when I gently place my hand on the forehead of the sick child, I know I am not alone. She is with me. And through my life, she continues to

serve.

Solemnity of the Exaltation of the Cross Celebrated Together

In Hegne, not only was the 200th birthday of Mother M. Theresia celebrated, but also the 130th birth anniversary of the Province of Baden-Württemberg. It was a joyful celebration with the Ulrika Circle of Friends, the Lyra Music Association and the Hegne Fanfare Band. The following lines report on the event.

A special celebration

‘Let’s celebrate together!’ In our jubilee year 2025, our titular feast of the Exaltation of the Cross was held under the motto ‘Together!’ The idea of celebrating a common feast together with the Ulrika-Friends Circle in Unterstadion already started last year. The bus pilgrimage from Unterstadion has been taking place not only since 1987, but since the beginning of the beatification process and the exhumation of Sr. Ulrika’s remains in 1952! This is important to the people of Unterstadion, and I don’t think it can be taken for granted.



Together in the church

The ‘Ulrika Bus Pilgrimage’ from the parish of Unterstadion to Hegne has been a tradition on the last Sunday of the school holidays since the beatification of Sr. Ulrika in 1987. For 25 years, pilgrims have been travelling by bicycle from Unterstadion and the surrounding area on the Saturday before the pilgrimage. Since the opening of the Ulrika Way, around 20 altar servers from Unterstadion have been coming to the convent on the Friday before the pilgrimage to help organise the Sunday Mass.

This traditional pilgrimage coincided with our province’s 130th anniversary and our Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross. It quickly became clear that the Unterstadion music association ‘Lyra’ would also schedule its outing for this weekend and play a morning pint for us after the joint church service. To make it a celebration together with the village of Hegne, the Hegne fanfare

band agreed to take care of the catering.

Dr. Peter Kohl, representative of the religious order and cathedral canon from Freiburg, was invited to be the main celebrant for the Mass, thus honouring the connection with the diocese. We were delighted by all these confirmations and were surprised by how many guests and pilgrims from near and far had come for our celebration. The music group, led by Klaus Fiederer, and the convent choir, with Roland Uhl as church musician, provided the music for the solemn Mass. Together with Dr. Peter Kohl, the parish priest of Unterstadion, Michael Klug, and the deacon, Prof. Dr. Florin Kluger, celebrated the Mass. In his touching homily, Dr. Kohl explained the mystery of the cross and resurrection to life in a very personal and vivid way. The basis for this were the two images 'The Crucified One' on the Isenheim Altarpiece by Matthias Grünewald and 'The Risen Christ' on the famous cross of San Damiano. They express that suffering and death do not have the last word. The cross and Easter belong together like two sides of a coin.

At the end of the Mass, Sr. Susanne Bader, our Provincial Superior,

thanked everyone who had helped to organise and celebrate the event, and invited them to a morning pint in the former stables of the convent. Members of the fanfare band were already waiting there, offering delicious grilled sausages, steaks and chips. Of course, beer was also a must at a get-together like this. With the rousing sounds of brass band music, good conversation, pleasant encounters and exchanges – including the appealing, hopeful sermon – waiting in line at the sausage stand was not boring. We heard the statement over and over again: 'This is really a wonderful celebration!' Yes, it was a celebration for all the senses that expressed more than words could ever say: we belong together, and being together brings joy!

70 Years of Mission in Taiwan

In 1926, some of our sisters were sent to Manchuria to support the missionaries of the Swiss Missionary Society Bethlehem, primarily in nursing and women's education. In 1953, foreign missionaries were expelled from China. Our sisters initially returned to Ingenbohl. The Bethlehem missionaries resumed their activities in 1953 in the south-east of the island of Taiwan, in the state of Taitung. Our sisters soon followed them. The date of their arrival on 5 May 1955 is considered the founding date of the Vicariate of Taiwan.

The Jubilee

On 1 November 2025, All Saints' Day, our sisters celebrated 70 years of mission in Taiwan. We extend our heartfelt congratulations and wish them God's blessings for the future. Sr. Gabriele Schachinger, Assistant General, participated in this special jubilee on behalf of the General Leadership.

Father Theodosius once said: 'God leads us to different places to work for His glory and for the good of the people.' This was also the case on 5 May 1955, when the first four sisters from Switzerland arrived in Taiwan, in the district of Taitung, at the



request of the priests from Immensee, with whom they had already worked on the mainland. For 70 years, the sisters have been working for the good of the people in a wide variety of areas: care for the elderly, care for children and the disabled, catechesis, pastoral care in parishes and prisons.



Bishop Philippe Huang Chau-Ming, who presided over the festive service, appreciated the work and witness of the sisters who left everything behind to serve God and the people.

A colourful cultural programme was offered to the approximately 600 participants, including a recognition of employees with many years of service.

The celebration of course, was also connected to the 200th birth anniversary of Mother M. Theresia



Scherer, our foundress, who strengthened the bond with the motherhouse - far beyond the celebration itself.



Sacred Places

The convent church in Gemünden

The history of the Province of Bavaria immerses us in a part of the Institute's history that is not familiar to everyone. Our community never lived in a fantasy world, but in the midst of political and social challenges. In the following pages, we experience the path of the cross and resurrection of the sisters of the Province of Bavaria, leading to their beautiful church, which is dedicated to the 'glorious and victorious cross'.

Pre-history of Bohemia

The Province of Bavaria has an eventful pre-history. Its roots go back to the Bohemian Province, founded in 1860, whose development began with the takeover of the cloth factory in Oberleutensdorf. After this project failed, the sisters ventured a new beginning in Eger in 1868. The following years saw a very positive



development. In 1939, the province had 955 sisters who worked in 72 institutions (branches) in the fields of teaching and upbringing, and caring for the sick, poor and orphans. After Hitler's troops marched into the German-populated border region of the Czechoslovak Republic (Sudetenland), a government decree dissolved all denominational schools and homes in February 1939. The sisters had to leave all schools, kindergartens and orphanages within a short period of time. Some of the sisters who were thus left unemployed went on to work as typists in hospitals, while others took on new roles at the request of the population in neighbouring Bavaria.

The Province Bavaria

In 1947, 129 sisters were already working mainly in the eastern border region of Bavaria. Sr. Alexandrina Brömse, the former Provincial Superior of Bohemia, , was given

responsibility for these sisters. She ensured that the Province of Bavaria could be founded in 1947. As groups of sisters continued to arrive in Bavaria from Bohemia between 1945 and 1950 and the number of new recruits also increased, it became necessary to establish a centre for the new province. This became all the more urgent when, in 1950, the Czech government confiscated the provincial house in Eger and ordered the sisters to leave within three days.

Gemünden, Provincial House and Convent Church

The search for a suitable building site proved difficult. After many fruitless efforts, a suitably large plot of land was finally acquired in Gemünden near the Main River. The provincial leadership commissioned Hans Beckers, a government architect from Regensburg, to plan and construct the entire building complex. Construction work on the provincial house began in 1956, and it was ready for occupancy in 1958. In a second construction phase, the convent church was built as the spiritual centre of the entire complex. Government architect Hans Beckers presented two designs to the provincial leadership:

the first was a square building, the second an oval building with a flat dome supported by concrete pillars on the outer walls. The provincial leadership opted for the second, more elaborate variant, as the church, as the centre of the entire complex, was to stand out clearly from the other buildings with its oval shape. On 28 October 1957, excavation of the foundation pit for the monastery church began. Fourteen months later, the ceremonial inauguration took place.

Design and Symbolism

Anyone turning into the driveway leading to the convent on the western edge of Gemünden today cannot fail to notice the unusual shape of the church building on the left-hand side. Upon entering the church, one is immediately struck by the unity of the space. The oval shape conveys the feeling of being welcomed into the space, embraced by it and sheltered within it. This feeling is reinforced by elements that further emphasise the oval shape:

- Twenty-four decorative columns inside the church (which have no supporting function) unite the altar area and the area for church visitors into a single unit and emphasise the oval basic



structure. The hanging lamps installed between the decorative columns reinforce this impression.

- There are no windows in the lower part of the church, which further emphasises the basic architectural structure of the space.
- The arrangement of small, colourful windows in the upper part of the side walls causes daylight to create a pearlescent shimmer on the opposite walls, which also emphasises the oval shape. When the lights are on in the church in the evening, the band of windows inside the church appears in a deep blue tone, while from the outside it looks like a colourful, shiny band.
- Originally, the tabernacle placed on the altar also had an oval shape (a miniature image of the church). This was later changed.

The monumental **cross** designed by South Tyrolean sculptor Siegfried Moroder, which hangs above the altar, is particularly impressive. It depicts Christ on the cross not as the suffering man of sorrows, but symbolises the self-sacrificing love, death and resurrection of Jesus. Christ, who redeemed the entire cosmos on the cross, stands on a dark blue disc, the 'ball' of the earth, as the place of salvation. From here, the figure of Christ rises up, connecting heaven and earth, as it were. Christ does not wear a crown of thorns. The dark-toned crossbeam is broken above the head, suggesting a halo. This refers to the king and victor. The outstretched arms express Christ's devotion and can also be interpreted as a gesture of embrace. His hands and feet are not nailed to the cross; the crossbeams are open at their ends, as is the lower vertical beam.



The light shining through these openings lightens the cross in some way. The head is tilted slightly forward, the face radiating a deep calm. The words 'It is finished' spontaneously come to mind. The Saviour's side wound, highlighted in colour, reveals his compassionate heart, consumed by love for us. The artist gave the cross he created, the title: «Gloriosissima et victoriosissima crux», (the most glorious and victorious cross). In doing so, he drew on what lies at the heart of the spirituality of the Holy Cross Sisters: looking at the crucified Christ, internalising his death and resurrection, and drawing strength from this to hear God's call in the manifold needs of the present

and to stand up for the disadvantaged, as our founders exemplified.

The **marble altar table** beneath the cross is impressive in its size and imposing form. It points to the outstanding significance of the Eucharistic event, to the devotion of the Son of God unto death on the Cross.

The originally oval-shaped **tabernacle** was replaced by a new one after the Second Vatican Council in connection with the liturgical reform. Its front depicts the heavenly city of God with 12 gates, in the centre of which is a white lamb on a blue background. The lamb symbolises Christ. He did not come as a ruler, but submitted to the will of his Father and gave his life on the cross. The white colour of the lamb indicates its innocence, the blue the supernatural, the divine.



The stele supporting the tabernacle features lines suggesting the waves of flowing water, symbolising the grace emanating from the tabernacle. The central message of the cross is thus emphasised and reinforced by the artistic representation of the tabernacle.



There are no statues of saints in the monastery church, except for a Baroque **Madonna** in a side niche, a 17th-century depiction of the Assumption of Mary into Heaven. At first glance, one might think that this Baroque statue does not fit into the modern church interior. However, as it is placed in a niche and is not immediately visible when entering the church, it does not interfere with

the overall impression of the room. Only when one approaches the altar area, it is possible to see the statue clearly. For the sisters who were expelled from Bohemia, it was and remains a precious memento of their lost homeland. The statue was initially located at the Palitz estate near Eger, which the Province of Bohemia had purchased in 1916. After the estate was confiscated by the communists in 1949, it was brought to the provincial house in Eger. When the sisters also had to leave the provincial house in 1950 and made their way to Bavaria, they took the statue of Mary with them. It remained their companion, so to speak, until a new beginning was possible in Gemünden. Therefore, it was to be given a worthy place in the new provincial house church.

Initially, a harmonium was used to provide musical accompaniment for church services. It was not until 1968 that the financial situation allowed for the purchase of an organ. It was built by master organ builder Zeilhuber from Altstätten/Allgäu and installed in the middle section of the gallery. This area was originally glazed, could be heated separately and was used by elderly and sick sisters. Today, the organ with two manuals, 19 stops and 1497 pipes can be heard here.



It accompanies the liturgical events and thus deepens the community of those attending the Mass.

For us sisters, the church dedicated to the 'glorious and victorious cross' is a place of strength, whose symbolism constantly reminds us of our mission and thus helps to keep our Charism alive in us:

'The mystery of the Cross and Resurrection shapes our way of life as Sisters of Mercy of the Holy Cross. From the power of this mystery, we seek to follow Christ.'

Reminiscences on many levels

Some lives shine so brightly that their light does not fade with time. Even after their earthly journey ends, they continue to inspire, to guide, and to remain alive in the hearts of those they touched. Sr. Angelica Kaufmann was one such soul. Through her deep faith, simplicity, and boundless love, she left a deep imprint on our congregation and on all who crossed her path. To the poor, she was a friend, to the children, a mother, to the youth, a guide, and to us, a living example of religious life.

If I am in Holy Cross today, I can say it is because of Sr. Angelica Kaufmann. In 1969, for the first time in the history of our home parish, the parish priest took four girls to Trasi to receive first-hand information about religious life. On arrival, we met Sr. Angelica, the first European Sister we had ever met. Her simplicity, poverty, and down-to-earth charm under the full moonlight instantly touched us. I heard an inner voice say, "This is the place for you."

When we returned home, two of us (Sr. Sujata D'Sa and I) responded without hesitation to the Lord's call. Within a few months, we returned to Trasi to join. The welcome we received, especially from Sr. Angelica, was beyond words. She was more than a mother to us, her embrace imprinted a bond that drew us into religious life.

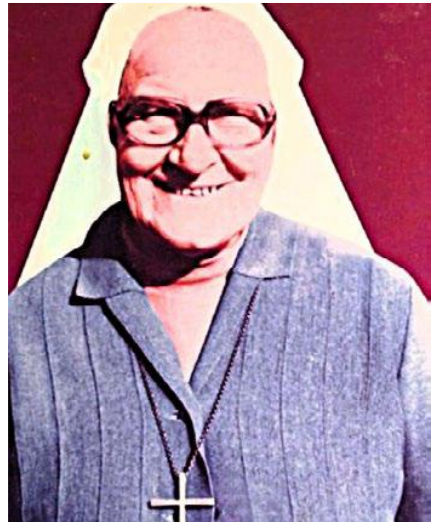
When the sisters first arrived in Trasi, they lived in a thatched-roof house, added to a neighbor's house. Sr. Angelica embraced the simple life wholeheartedly. She carried children, comforted crying babies, and never showed irritation. She won people's hearts by learning a few words of the local language and joining prayers during Mass, even reading the English script.

Her life was a testimony of discipline, hard work, and tender care. When we returned from Hazaribag to continue our studies, she instilled in us the value of prayer and manual work- "Ora et Labora." Her honesty and precision were

remarkable. I recall one incident when she found her monthly account short of 50 paisa(coin). She made us search for two days, until she herself found it, her patience and persistence remain etched in my memory.

Her respect for the Church and its leaders was immense. She valued the guidance of Fr. Michael Noronha, who welcomed the Holy Cross Sisters to Trasi. Despite the distance of 5 km from the church, Sr. Angelica never missed the Holy Eucharist. Many times, she cycled to attend reconciliation or to discuss matters of mission.

Sr. Angelica envisioned a future for the Trasi mission with possibilities for medical, educational, and social ministries. With utmost care, she treated patients and made home visits, even at long distances. Her greatest achievement was saving Alban D'Silva (Sr. Genevieve's brother) from an umbilical cord infection requiring surgery. The news of his survival spread quickly, and people saw her as a replica of divinity. She continued her mission with the same spirit in Neermarga as well.



Looking back, I realize that Sr. Angelica's presence was not only a blessing for Trasi, but also for each of us who had the privilege of knowing her. Her life was a testimony of service, humility, and unwavering faith. She shaped our journeys with quiet strength and gentle love, and her vision continues to guide the mission she began. Though she is no longer physically among us, her legacy lives on, in the communities she served, in the sisters she inspired, and in every heart she touched.

Information from the General Leadership Conferences in Ingenbohl

The Provincial Treasurers' Conference and the Provincial Superiors' Conference, with all the provincial and vicariate superiors and the USA house, took place during the jubilee year and were blessed with special grace. All participants experienced their time at the mother house as something precious.

The conference of superiors and their treasurers took place during the week from 26 to 30 August. Under the leadership of General Treasurer Sr. Mirjam Jerković and Kurt Zwahlen, the topics of reporting, the Charismatic Plan and its implementation, and fundraising were discussed. The theme safeguarding (guidelines against abuse and mistreatment) was the focus on 30 August. Sr. Grazia Vittigni from the Province Italy was prepared to convey the topic competently with the help of a PowerPoint presentation.

In the second week, the treasurers visited some important places of our Congregation: Meggen, Einsiedeln, Hegne and Ranft, where Brother Klaus von Flüe, our patron saint of peace and the nation, lived in the 15th century. The international nature added a very special touch to the Holy Mass. For the conference participants, practising the multilingual songs in advance was a cheerful yet serious way to get in the spirit for the celebration.
